Late afternoon, just north of the ghost town of Tip Top, our final three explorers stopped at this abandoned ranch to stretch their legs and wash away the trail dust!

Had a good turnout for our Boulder Creek run, 13 vehicles. Everyone had a good time, the weather was perfect, 82, with a nice cool breeze. I did not have time to do a pre-run, so the trail rating I gave it (from previous runs) was a little outdated. Running Boulder Creek up to the windmill was more like a 3 1/2 rating than a 3.

We stopped to have lunch about a mile short of the windmill, our original lunch destination. A third of our group went back from there, while the rest of us moved forward. After a short break to check out the windmill, most chose to turn back while Jim Hopper, Dave & Paula and I decided to continue on.



We reached the Black Canyon overlook at around 2:30. After a brief stop for pictures we decided to do the full loop. The trail provided plenty of challenges, breath taking views and solitude. There were no signs of any tire tracks of any kind.

We were on pace to make it back to the Table Mesa staging area by 7 pm, until we ran into a broken down Toyota pickup in the middle of the road. The young driver, Kyle, just returned from serving 4 1/2 years in Kuwait had decided to go explore Tip Top Mine by himself. On his return he broke his front passenger side CV axle. He was lying underneath strapping it up to keep it from dragging when we arrived. To make it safer to drive, we talked him into allowing us to help him remove the axle.

Nearly an hour was spent with no success. We needed a 1-7/16" socket and we had a 1-5/16" and 1-1/2"! I was able to squeeze by him to offer a strap if needed, while Dave & Jim followed behind. To be safe we crawled along at around 5 mph back to the staging area, a distance of about 7 miles, arriving at around 10:00.

The nylon strap held together, but to make it safer to drive on the freeway, we replaced the nylon strap with hose clamps. Kyle was very appreciative. We handed him an M4W card and told him to check out our website and try to avoid wheeling alone!

OLD BUSH HIGHWAY

THE HIGHWAYS HISTORY: Before the 1930s, if you wanted to travel from Mesa to Payson, would drive the Apache Trail from Mesa to Roosevelt Lake, cross the dam, and travel up the "Globe Road" (now AZ 188) to Payson. It was slow going and could take up to 12 hours depending on weather and road conditions. Your only other option, and not a very good one, was to drive to Fort McDowell and take the "Reno Road" to Sunflower, where it turned east over the Mazatzal Mountains and reached Camp Reno, near what is now Punkin Center, and then turn north to Payson. Both roads were narrow and rocky and subject to washouts after heavy rain, and parts of the Reno Road, originally a wagon trail, were very steep, and littered with broken wagons and their erstwhile contents.

In the 1920s, Harvey Granville Bush - a man who owned a lumber business in Mesa, and a vacation cabin near Tonto Fish Hatchery – led a group of business leaders in lobbying the Maricopa County Board of Supervisors to build a road from the north end of Power Road in Mesa to the Reno Road which led to Sunflower and from there build a road directly into the Payson Basin, ending near Jake's Corner. In 1932, plans were drawn up, and construction began. The "highway" was completed in May 1934, and was named "Bush Highway" after Harvey Granville Bush. It was not much of a highway by today's standards – 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ lanes wide, and a dusty dirt surface, but it was graded nicely, and cut the distance from Mesa to Payson by 25 miles.

The Bush Highway was the main route from the Valley to Payson for over 20 years, when construction of the Beeline Highway began in the mid-1950s. The Beeline Highway was initially constructed as a paved 2-lane highway, and over the years has been widened to 4 lanes, and during widening has been moved in places from its original alignment.

There was never any effort to erase the existing segments of Bush Highway during construction of the Beeline Highway, and all sections of the old highway which were not obliterated by coinciding with today's Beeline Highway alignment still exist – either as Forest Roads, or as barely accessible graded pathways. This series of geocaches takes you to most of the existing sections of the old "highway" where you will either drive them (where possible), or walk them, sometimes both!

OPEN INVITATION TO RUN THE RUBICON TRAIL AND DO SIERRA TREK AUGUST 2016

BACKGROUND

While running Dusey-Ershim Trail last September there were several folks who mentioned wanting to run the Rubicon Trail this year. As we sat around the campfire with antifreeze coursing through our blood vessels I mentioned doing Sierra Trek too.

There was generally a very positive response even after the carnage on Thompson Hill. Mike Drawsky talked with me some more and I promised to research dates, logistics, etc. and see who might be interested.

DATES

Sierra Trek runs from Aug. 11-14th. The Jeep Jamboree is exactly the same time.

Both Sierra Trek and the Jamboree are very close geographically so there is not much driving in between the two events.

My suggestion is to run the Rubicon the week before (August 8-12 range) the Jamboree-Sierra Trek, take a few days off to recreate around the Lake Tahoe area then hit Sierra Trek which is up the mountains just above Truckee, CA.

I would discourage doing the Rubicon after the Jamboree as the trail will probably be torn up and may be closed for cleaning and repairs.

BASIC FORMAT FOR EACH ACTIVITY

The Rubicon is an unstructured event, just us. We meet up, camp, drive, camp being totally self-sufficient. Three days on the trail is great with two nights camping. No rush, time to hike, explore and take in the superb high Sierra beauty. In the first day at Loon Lake and out the third day near Homewood on the NW shore of Lake Tahoe. About 17 miles of 4x4 skill building fun.

Sierra Trek is a structured event.

Registration is required and a fee charged to be involved in the sanctioned events. Breakfasts and dinners are included plus raffles, live music, no host bar and tons of fun. Most of the big name 4x4 off road racing supply companies are there with displays, T-shirts and goodies for sale. This is a huge event with many hundreds of folks plus some pretty wild machines not to mention the five dreaded Winch Hills and Fordyce Creek. All this at about 8,000 feet up in the forest with camping by Meadow Lake. The area is rich with early mining history, old graveyard and loads of day runs to explore. The Fordyce Creek run (5 winch hills) is the attraction but plenty of other runs are available.

While porta toilets, meals and other amenities are provided we will be camping.

OPTION IDEAS

There may be some who want to do both events, some just the Rubicon or Sierra Trek. You know your schedule, likes and dislikes, your call.

RESEARCH

I suggest you take time to do your homework and look into the following.

Search...

The Rubicon Trail. Tons of links, blogs, You Tube, etc.

CAL4wheelers. Sierra Trek or Winch Hills. These searches, like the Rubicon, will bring up gobs of info.

Pay close attention to the CAL4 info, they are the sponsoring group. Look at registration, safety and vehicle requirements.

If you have questions, concerns or want to know more about the area please contact me. I have done both runs several times and am very familiar with the area. Maggie and I summer just north of Truckee. Reno is near for commercial flights, Truckee has a very fine general aviation airport and all services are available in that great town. All supplies, stores you name it can be had there.

For those of you who know Pete Engberg and his friend Steve from the Rubicon run several years back and Dusey-Ershim last September they'll be at Sierra Trek.

Also my Northern Sierra 4x4 Club will run (Sierra Trek) it too so we'll have lots local knowledge-company.

Tonto National Forest Release Public feedback welcome on proposed changes to motor vehicle use designations

The Coconino National Forest is considering changes to which roads, trails, and areas are open to motor vehicle use on the Forest and would like your input. In September 2011, the Coconino National Forest completed analysis of motorized use designations required by the Travel Management Rule (TMR; 36 CFR 212). Since this decision, the Forest has received helpful feedback to modify road, trail and area designations to better support a fun, safe, and ecologically sustainable motorized roads system. To make these designation changes, the Forest is initiating the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) planning process to receive specific feedback on the proposed motor vehicle use designation changes. The proposal and supporting documents can be accessed at the links below. All comments and suggested changes to the proposal can be emailed to comments-southwesterncoconino@fs.fed.us.

Tonto National Forest Releases Travel Management Draft Decision

- Tonto National Forest Releases Travel
 Management Draft Decision
- PHOENIX, June 10, 2016—For Immediate Release. The Tonto National Forest released a draft decision on the Travel Management Project today, which designates a system of roads, trails, and areas for motorized use, as well as prohibits general cross-country travel.
- "I realize not everyone will be happy with the decision. It is the Tonto National Forest's best effort to strike a reasonable balance that is responsive to the vast majority of public input the Forest received," said Neil Bosworth, Forest Supervisor.
- While Bosworth recognizes some users' favorite routes may no longer be open for motor vehicle use, the Forest tried to provide a range of opportunities across the Tonto National Forest. "I know motor vehicle users like to ride loops and visit a variety of scenery. We tried to provide for those opportunities while simultaneously protecting natural resources and providing for those who seek a more quiet recreational experience on the Forest."
- This draft decision comes after a sevenyear planning process that included extensive public participation and review of more than 5,000 miles of roads and trails. During this time, the Tonto National Forest has provided a number of proposals for a designated road and trail system to the public for review and comment. These public comments were used to develop a comprehensive analysis called the Final Environmental Impact Statement, on which

- the recent Travel Management draft decision was based.
- This decision provides a starting point for management of motor vehicle use on the Tonto National Forest in compliance with the Final Travel Management Rule. The Final Rule, established in 2005, directs each forest to provide for appropriate motorized access and motorized recreation opportunities while protecting important forest resources and non-motorized recreation opportunities.
- Today's release of the draft decision is subject to the predecisional objection process described in 36 CFR Part 218, Subparts A and B. Objections must be filed within 45 days of the publication of the legal notice announcing the draft decision in the Arizona Capitol Times. Those that previously commented on the project have the opportunity to submit an objection based on their previous comment. A decision will not be made until the objection process is complete.
- The Draft Record of Decision and Final Environmental Impact Statement for the Tonto National Forest Travel Management Project are now available online
